# 2025 Highlights

#### **Future of Credentialing**

Launched in 2023, this initiative helps members and credentialing organizations build a culture of foresight within their own organizations and prepare for emerging possibilities to come. In 2025, I.C.E. advanced this work with:

- Strategic Scenarios Documents: I.C.E. released a strategic scenarios document to help credentialing organizations explore the impact of future possibilities.
- Ecosystem Model: I.C.E. developed an ecosystem model mapping all entities and dynamics within the credentialing environment to guide strategic conversations.
- Focus Groups: I.C.E. conducted a series of focus groups to inform case studies and tools supporting the Future of Credentialing Report.

In addition, I.C.E. shared its foresight story with the broader association community. Executive Director Denise Roosendaal presented the following:

- March 2025: Panel discussion with 100+ participants: Better Together: Successfully Integrating Foresight and Strategic Planning.
- · June 2025: Foresight Fridays sponsored by ASAE.
- August 2025: ASAE Annual Conference reprise of the March webinar, reaching 100+ attendees.

#### **DE&I Resources**

I.C.E. continues to advance its DE&I efforts through an active committee, new resources, and member engagement opportunities.

- DE&I Research Report: In 2025, I.C.E. re-launched the
  research report with updated formatting and insights,
  highlighting where credentialing bodies are on their DE&I
  journeys and showcasing practices that integrate DE&I into
  organizational and credentialing work. The report was also
  featured in the article I.C.E. Survey Data Shows Member
  Support for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, which included
  the perspective of a DE&I Committee member.
- Coffee Chats: The committee hosted two coffee chats in 2025. These remain very popular, drawing between 50-100 participants for open discussions on key issues such as navigating federal responses and executive orders while continuing DE&I progress.

#### I.C.E. Certified Credentialing Professional® (ICE-CCP®) Program

The I.C.E. Certified Credentialing Professional (ICE-CCP) allows credentialing professionals to demonstrate their knowledge, skills, and abilities in governance, program operations, and assessment development and validation. I.C.E. hosts two testing windows annually, in the spring and fall. The I.C.E. Certification Services Council is the governing body, made up of 12 experienced members of the credentialing community, who meet monthly to work with I.C.E. staff to review and refine the program.

- ICE-CCP Certification Prep Materials: I.C.E. offers a self-study guide and an ICE-CCP prep workshop to support individuals interested in pursuing their ICE-CCP. A practice exam was released in October 2025. In September 2025, a panel of five ICE-CCPs presented a webinar, "Navigating ICE-CCP: Insights from Certified Professionals on Earning, Maintaining, and Recertification."
  - I.C.E. is grateful for the support and expertise from subject matter experts who contributed to the development and delivery of all resources.
- ICE-CCP® Certificants: A total of 326 individuals have been awarded the ICE-CCP since the beta exam in October 2021, including 74 since November 2024. Click here for a full list of ICE-CCP certified professionals.
- ICE-CCP Recertification: In 2025 to date, more than 75 individuals have submitted applications to renew their ICE-CCP. To support ICE-CCP recertification, I.C.E. is working on a pre-approved CE program expected to launch before the end of 2025.



# 2025 Highlights

#### **Professional Certification Coalition (PCC)**

As a founding member of the PCC, I.C.E. helped secure a major policy win in 2025: the inclusion of credentialing related expenses in 529 College Savings Plan through the 2025 Budget Reconciliation Act via the *Freedom to Invest in Tomorrow's Workforce Act*. Signed into law on July 4, the act expands 529 plans to cover costs for occupational licenses and professional certifications. This important change transforms 529 plans from education savings vehicles into more flexible career savings plans.

Accredited programs, programs listed in the military COOL databases, or programs recognized by WIOWA, are automatically included as an approved provider for consideration by the state 529 plans. **More details and FAQs are available here**.

#### **Credentialing Insights**

As the official digital publication of I.C.E., *Credentialing Insights* serves as a vital resource for connecting our community and advancing the expertise of our members. Through case studies, I.C.E. updates, DE&I strategies, forward-looking thought leadership, and technical pieces, the publication supports I.C.E.'s core goals: membership and community, professional advancement, accreditation services, organizational and cultural foundation, and external focus.

Between August 2024 and July 2025, the most-read articles include:

**2025 Reader Survey:** In 2025, I.C.E. conducted a reader survey to assess value and gather feedback on content preferences, with nearly 75% of respondents rated *Credentialing Insights* articles as valuable or very valuable. Input will guide editorial direction in 2026.

#### **Professional Development**

I.C.E. continues to provide educational programs and opportunities to support credentialing professionals:

Certificate Program for Credentialing Specialists: Launched in November 2014, this multi-modal, assessment-based online self-study course has become a comprehensive resource for credentialing professionals. In 2025, 177 participants enrolled, bringing total participation to more than 1,700 professionals across 21 enrollment periods. To ensure the program remains current and relevant, I.C.E. convened a working group to evaluate the content, and a refreshed version of the course will launch in January 2026.

**Leadership Development Program:** I.C.E. hosted its fourth cohort of the **Leadership Development Program** in 2025, selecting **15 emerging leaders** in the credentialing community to discuss leadership concepts, expand their network, and prepare for new leadership roles and responsibilities. This year-long program continues to grow our future leaders. Registration for the 2025–2026 cohort opens in November 2025 after the Exchange.

#### **Webinars, Town Halls, and Member Conversations:**

I.C.E.'s Education Committee selected and hosted a series of webinars on topics including *With Great Power Comes Great Responsibility: Developing Community-Led Principles for the Use of Generative AI, How to Build a Small-Scaled Program into a Big-Scaled Success, and Navigating ICE-CCP: Insights from Certified Professionals on Earning, Maintaining, and Recertification. I.C.E. also two hosted town halls on the NCCA AI Guidance document and revisions to the ICE 1100 Standard.* 

**I.C.E. Sponsored Webinars:** I.C.E. launched our sponsored content program, providing sustaining and affiliate members the opportunity showcase their thought leadership with the I.C.E. community. I.C.E. hosted two sponsored webinars to over 500 attendees:

- Breaking Barriers: How Digital Learning Transforms Global Credentialing Success | sponsored by BenchPrep
- Smarter, Not Just Faster: Lessons From Real-World Al-Assisted Test Development | sponsored by PSI

# 2025 Highlights

**Workshops:** I.C.E. achieved a total of 179 workshop attendees. This includes two ACAP workshops with 44 attendees, three NCCA workshops with 49 attendees, two ICE-CCP Prep Workshops with 45 attendees, and two Psychometrics and Test Development Workshops in partnership with Meazure Learning with 62 attendees.

**2025 Exchange:** The I.C.E. Exchange is an annual gathering for the credentialing community to exchange ideas on industry trends and best practices, connect with each other, and participate in high quality education. I.C.E. is hosting the 2025 Exchange in Phoenix, Arizona.

The Program Committee received a record 229 proposals and selected 30% to build a program for credentialing professionals of all levels. The committee held a conference preview webinar in October, featuring sessions not included in the Exchange schedule. The committee will continue to host a first-time attendee orientation and reception to welcome those new to the event.

#### **Research & Development**

I.C.E.'s Research Think Tank continues to build a modernized approach to credentialing research. The Think Tank conducted a market research study to identify compelling topics that will resonate with internal and external stakeholders alike. This study will result in a multi-year research agenda for the organization. A subgroup of the Research Think Tank has been examining how the I.C.E. research papers are designed and disseminated to enhance readability and usage. **Visit our website to learn more**.

#### **Committee and Other Programming**

I.C.E.'s committees and task forces develop an abundance of individual projects throughout the year. Here are just a few released in 2025:

**Public Member Resources**: Under the direction of the Public Member Committee, I.C.E. continued to offer quarterly Public Member networking calls open to all public members and interested parties of the I.C.E. community. Public Members are invited to join the Public Member Committee at any point in the year.

**Government Affairs Coffee Chat:** The Government Affairs Committee hosted three conversations in 2025 on navigating federal funding cuts and executive orders as well as the national impact of accreditation scrutiny. The coffee chats have welcomed over 100 attendees to these informal exchanges.

Membership Outreach Committee: The Membership Outreach Committee plays a vital role in contributing to I.C.E.'s membership growth goals by recruiting membership prospects and enhancing I.C.E's marketing initiatives through testimonials. The membership outreach committee collaborated on a membership survey to better understand valuable member benefits.

#### **Online Community**

I.C.E.'s online community serves as an open forum for members to connect with their peers on program practices, requests for resources and networking. Over the past year the online community saw over 650 active users.



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# Accreditation Services

# **Accreditation Services**

I.C.E. extends its gratitude to the 2025 volunteer Accreditation Services Council (ASC), National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), and Assessment-Based Certificate Accreditation Council (ACAC) for their unwavering dedication and invaluable contributions to the credentialing community. Your tireless efforts continue to elevate credentialing standards and inspire excellence across the profession.

Accreditation Services Council (ASC): The ASC addresses strategic issues related to accreditation, including accreditation processes, growth potential, customer service, marketing guidance, and policy improvement recommendations related to I.C.E. Accreditation Services. In 2025, the Council continued it's work on promoting the value of accreditation.

National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA): The National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA) is the accrediting body of I.C.E., providing a framework of standards for evaluating and accrediting professional certification programs across a wide range of occupations. Its primary mission is to protect public health, welfare, and safety by accrediting programs that assess and demonstrate professional competency in a valid and reliable manner.

In addition to reviewing accreditation applications, the NCCA introduced the resource, *Guidance on Use of Artificial*Intelligence (AI) in Certification Programs to support certification programs as they consider how to incorporate AI into operations while maintaining compliance with the NCCA Standards. It outlines key considerations for human oversight, confidentiality, fairness, and documentation across all phases of the certification lifecycle — from job analysis and examination development to scoring and recertification. The NCCA also hosted a Town Hall to support stakeholder understanding and application of the AI Guidance. The NCCA Commissioners will host a session at the 2025 I.C.E. Exchange and are available to discuss the NCCA Standards with certification program staff who are interested in accreditation or are currently accredited.


#### **Assessment-based Certificate Accreditation Program**

(ACAP): The ACAP program allows certificate programs to be accredited to the I.C.E. 1100:2019 Standard for Assessment-Based Certificate Programs, which is recognized as an American National Standard.

I.C.E. continued its comprehensive project to review and update the I.C.E. 1100 Standard, which began in August 2024. This initiative ensures the Standard remains current, relevant, and reflective of practices in the industry. The main committee completed its first round of public comment and initiated a second round to invite feedback from the broader credentialing community. As the I.C.E. 1100 is an American National Standard, the committee anticipates submitting the required documentation to revise the Standard by the end of 2025.

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# Looking Ahead to 2026

The I.C.E. Board of Directors and Management continue to shape the organization along the strategic vision established in the organization's strategic Ends Statements. In this pursuit, the Board and Management are focusing on the following projects for 2026.

Membership Growth: I.C.E. retained 93 percent of 2024 members and welcomed 51 new members in 2025, including 15 through a new limited one-year individual membership option focused on the benefits of the professional development offerings in the I.C.E. community. This growth expands our reach and brings more voices into the credentialing community as we continue exploring new ways to grow.

**Future of Credentialing Project:** The Future of Credentialing report provides a stream of research and resources to empower credentialing leaders to create a culture of foresight in their organizations, leading to a vibrant culture of foresight across the credentialing community. I.C.E. will build on the Future of Credentialing Summit, hosted at the 2025 Exchange, introducing scenario planning, case studies, facilitation training, infographics, and will continue to test the concepts in the report. **Learn More**.

The I.C.E. Board also engaged in a strategic activity, identifying the ecosystem in which credentialing exists. This work will be used to guide strategy moving forward. In 2026, resources will be developed to support credentialing organizations to consider the ecosystems in which they exist.

**DE&I Resources Page:** Looking ahead, the committee is enhancing the DE&I resource page on the I.C.E. website with new tools such as a fillable DE&I maturity model and journey map to guide organizations in reframing or rebranding their DE&I efforts and support meaningful discussion and strategic planning.

**ICE-CCP:** I.C.E. will continue to invest in the program with a job analysis planned for 2026.

**Research & Development:** I.C.E. is excited to re-launch research activities in 2026 with a new multi-year research agenda as well as revised methodology thanks to the work of the R&D Think Tank and a market survey identifying desired topics. I.C.E. will also create an infographic series based on findings in past research reports to share key takeaways and expand reach of the report findings.

Accreditation Resources: I.C.E. is developing new tools and resources to help better demonstrate the value of accreditation and related services. These will build on existing resources, such as the 2024 Value of NCCA Accreditation customizable brochure, which help accredited programs explain their accreditation to key stakeholders.

**Education Updates:** I.C.E. is preparing new resources for the year ahead. Highlights include:

- Business of Certification: I.C.E. assumed publication of the handbook and will offer a workshop in 2026 on its core concepts.
- Program Updates: Work is underway to update both the Certificate Program for the Credentialing Specialist and Fundamental Topics in Certification.
- Al Working Group: This new group is guiding I.C.E. in identifying tools members may need as they adopt Al in credentialing operations, while also exploring ways to enhance I.C.E.'s own member services.
- ICE 1100 Standard: The updated standard for assessmentbased certificate programs is scheduled to launch in 2026, accompanied by a workshop and resources to support programs pursuing accreditation.



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
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
